Christmas 2022 is going to be different for us – in all likelihood we will be in Australia with our children and grandchildren – and, not meaning to make you jealous at all, but we suspect the temperature will be around 30 degrees Centigrade (we may even get into the sea and have a swim, who knows?)!



In spite of the fact that 65% of the population are Christian, Christmas feels so far just as commercialised here in Fiji as it is in the UK - on 11th November (Remembrance Day) we went out to the shop in the early evening only to discover all the counter staff wearing Santa hats and there being tinsel and decorations celebrating Christmas all over the shop!

We will be part of an exodus for Christmas this year, with several students having finished their studies and left for their homes, several staff heading out of Fiji as well, to New Zealand or Australia or elsewhere and so we ask for safe journeys for them all, and for your prayers for those who are having to stay here on their own. One of our

new friends (from North India), Alemla (Senior Lecturer in Theology and Ethics), will be many miles away from her husband and family who are still in North India working and living, so we will be thinking of her.

As we participate in an exodus we reflect on how easy (relatively) it is for us to travel and remember how Mary and Joseph had a long journey (on foot and donkey-back?), a birth in an unfamiliar place, the crowding of shepherds and wise people and then a rushed exodus to a foreign country (Egypt) and we keep on being reminded how important it is for those of us who claim to follow in Christ's ways to be open and hospitable to those around us who are finding life tough.

We know that this winter for many in the UK it is going to be an immense struggle – we pray that you will all be able to keep open your hearts to share the warmth of Christ's love with the

stranger, the foreigner, the ones seeking shelter and food.

Call for benefits to rise in line with prices

The President of the Methodist Conference, the Revd Canon Graham Thompson, has joined a call for the Government to affirm its commitment to ensuring benefits rise in line with inflation.

Along with the Revd Fiona Bennett, Moderator of General Assembly, United Reformed Church, and the Revd Lynn Green, General Secretary, Baptist Union of Great Britain, he points out:

"The social security system should prevent families from being pushed into hardship, yet foodbanks are facing rapidly rising demand and almost half of claimants receiving Universal Credit report skipping meals to make ends meet.

"The value of benefits has declined for the last decade and already an average family of four relying on Universal Credit will be £1,400 worse off this winter than last – despite the interventions already put in place. Against this background it would be outrageous to erode benefits further."



Who is the Baby?

A little girl was examining a Christmas crib with her grandmother and commented, 'Grannie, it's really nice, but there's one thing that bothers me: is the baby Jesus ever going to grow up? He's the same size He was last year!!' The birth of Jesus must be the most well-known birth in the world, but are we really growing in our understanding of this story?

The angels announced, 'Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; He is the Messiah, the Lord.' (Luke 2: 10,11). The birth of a baby is a time of great joy and excitement and Jesus' birth is good news for all people! He is none other than the king of the universe, who has come as our Saviour. To experience this joy, we must let go self-centredness and living as our own saviour. His deliverance and wholeness is a real cause for joy!



'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favour rests.' (Luke 2:14). We may feel anything but peace with God, ourselves, or even with those closest to us at Christmas. Sacred Spaces

On Sunday 30 October the Revd Eddie Boon, Thames North Synod's Discipleship Enabler, led an interesting and informative Discipleship service and workshop at Lancaster Road URC, for members of the three churches in the North Enfield Pastorate.

Eddie looked at growing discipleship, using the analogy of **seven sacred spaces** in medieval monasteries and nunneries. He invited us to consider what these spaces were used for and how this is relevant for our churches today.

Although many monasteries had communal dormitories, some had individual **cells** for sleeping and praying to God. The cells were sometimes painted with biblical scenes to assist devotions. The cells were the only private places in the monasteries – this reminds us that we can be Christians both on our own as well as with others.

The **chapel** or church would be used for communal worship, which would include preaching, singing and praying. There were set patterns of worship at regular times throughout the day. This required discipline to attend and participate, as well as patience to wait on the will of God, which we also need today.

In the **chapter house**, usually a rectangular or polygonal structure, a chapter of the Bible or the Monastic Rule would be read out. Decisions would be made after discussion. We were reminded that in our churches we need to listen to each other and to accept decisions made with which we might disagree.

The **cloisters** were covered walkways in the form of a square with an open space in the middle and they connected the various sections of the monastery. Monks and nuns would walk under cover from one part to another in the course of each day and could have unexpected as well as planned meetings with others. Similarly in our churches we

should take advantage of both planned and unplanned meetings to speak to people, especially visitors.


The **garden** was a place of work where fruits and vegetables were grown to provide food and wine to support the monastic community. Medicinal herbs grown in the garden were used to help cure those who were ill in the infirmary (there were also fish ponds, and animals and birds were kept, sometimes by lay brothers, to provide meat, eggs, milk, hides and wool). The physical exercise involved provided a balance with mental work which we also need in our lives.

The **refectory** was where communal meals were taken. There would often be a picture of Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples on the end wall, as well as a pulpit so that instruction could be given. The refectory would also be used to provide hospitality to visitors. We can benefit from meeting socially with our fellow Christians for a meal and can also appreciate what we are eating and realise the value of serving others.

Before the invention of the printing press using movable type in the 15th century, scribes in the scriptorium would copy out and illuminate scriptures and other sacred texts, together with books of prayers and chants. We can learn and grow spiritually by reading and listening to the word of God, singing and praying.

I am sure that those who participated in the workshop found it helpful and I hope that Eddie Boon may be able to visit us again.



Mary's Christmas

As Jesus' mother, Mary plays a crucial part in the Christmas story. It begins with Gabriel's visit to her: 'Do not be afraid, Mary, you have found favour with God. You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call him Jesus.' (Luke 1:30,31). This conversation takes us straight to the heart of what Christmas is all about. God was doing something unique, that had never happened before! 'God was beginning, at this divine and human point, the New Creation of all things. The whole soiled and weary universe quivered at this direct injection of essential life.' (CS Lewis).

This child unites heaven and earth: the eternal God entered time and space and became a baby, both a real human being and fully divine. It reminds me of the sci-fi film Fantastic Voyage (1966) in which a team of surgeons are shrunk to the size of blood cells and injected into the veins of a patient to perform lifesaving surgery. The Christmas message affirms that God has entered the bloodstream of humanity to put things right with Him on the inside. We can know Him personally and make sense of His world.

God chose an unknown, frightened teenage girl to bring about this new beginning for the world. Her response is the pattern for us, as we



welcome God's special gift into our lives this Christmas: "I am the Lord's servant" Mary answered. "May your word to me be fulfilled." (Luke 1:38).

Mary gave an unqualified Yes to all that God wanted to do in her life. It was a costly decision, which risked both shame and scandal. Yet she was ready to obey God and trust His plans for her life, despite her many questions. Is the same true for us this Christmas?

Reflecting Faith: the Cross in our churches

I recently read a web article which was wondering if Christians actually need a 'cross' in our church buildings; or indeed if they were unhelpful in our worship. The major argument against having one, it seems, was that it could become the focus of our worship, and it is not okay to worship idols.

To me this argument is nonsensical. The cross is a graphic reminder of what Jesus Christ has done for us in His death. No one in their senses would dream of worshipping a cross itself, as it was the most humiliating and debasing form of capital punishment – it was a means of gruesome execution.

Christians use crosses in churches to remind people of just how far Jesus was prepared to go to rescue us from what St Paul called 'the dominion of darkness'.

So this Sunday, why not have a look around your local church building, and count how many crosses there are?

I would expect there to be 'hidden' crosses where the building was consecrated, and also under the altar itself. There will also be various paperwork, service books, sheets and hymnals which all have the sign of the cross on their covers.

Perhaps you have candle holders with crosses sculptured into them. And in most churches you will see a cross on or above the altar table itself.

Have a look around your church building – both inside and outside for crosses. What materials are they made from? How extravagant or glamorous are they? Are they Crosses (an 'empty' cross) or Crucifixes (with a representation of Christ hanging on the cross)?

How do they aid you in your worship and how much do they reflect your faith?

Boys' Brigade News

Merry Christmas Everyone! Feliz Navidad! Merry Xmas Everybody! Christmas time is here and here is the latest BB Update as we step into Christmas. The brass band is coming along really well as they continue to develop and move into the time of year where the Christmas songs are practiced, rehearsed and performed. As we go round the Avenues, Roads and Streets of Bush Hill Park, collecting donations as part of our annual fundraising, the brass band will be in full force behind us all the way, there might not be so much of a silent night! Along side brass band, the younger group of the Company section are also continuing in their First Aid. The older group in the Company section have been doing a model craft making model tanks. I could go with the obvious, 'two fish are in a tank, one turns to the other and says can you drive this thing?' joke but I won't. They will be closely following instructions to construct their miniature models, although hopefully not so closely that they walk around wearing two jackets because it says paint with two coats! I



told my friend I'd built a model of the Himalayas, "to scale" he said. "No, just to look at I replied".

Part of our Senior's group have been and will be cooking. Having made burgers, spaghetti, pork and apple sausage rolls (pictured left) and Bifteki with roasted new potatoes and Tzatziki topped

with halloumi (pictured right) already; they will be making their own pizzas with toppings of their choice, last time we made Hawaiian pizzas they burnt so this time we're going to cook them at aloha temperature. They will also be making chipotle chicken burgers and a chicken stir fry in the coming weeks. For the different meals they'll be cooking they'll learn different cutting techniques for the various different dishes, brunoising onions and tomatoes,



chiffonading parsley and mint and slicing chicken, cabbage and other vegetables, crushing garlic. Brunoising is a fine dicing technique to allow the fine dicing of vegetables and fruit. Chiffonading is used generally on leady vegetables and herbs, cutting to your own preferred thickness. The other part of the Seniors group have been doing cooking also, in conjunction with other sporting skills activities. One member of the Seniors, who has displayed expert onion cutting skills, has to remain unnamed as they used to belong to a secret cooking society, unfortunately they got kicked out for spilling the beans!
