

The URC partnered with food poverty charity Trussell (who shares its offices in London) at the Greenbelt Festival, at Boughton House, Kettering, over the August Bank Holiday.

Greenbelt is a culturally and politically engaged festival with a committed Christian faith and worldview. The venue included talks, worship and debates alongside yoURCafe, serving food rescued from going to landfill by the brilliant team at Refuse, Chester le Street, and at Lodge Road Community Church, Birmingham and lots of teas, coffees and cakes.

The three-day festival included a communion service attended by thousands which reminded us that hope is something we need to keep choosing and practising, and to celebrate the strength of Jesus' resurrection and the power of God's promises.

Plastic carrier bags

This year marks ten years since England introduced the 5p charge for single-use plastic carrier bags. The charge has had a dramatic effect – with a reduction of 98% in sales.

In 2014, 7.6 billion single-use plastic bags were sold in the UK. By 2023, 133 million single-use bags had been sold in the major supermarkets. The average person in the UK now buys only about two single-use plastic bags per year.



It's UN World Food Day. It often focuses on how investment in food security and rural development will change the future of migration. We can play our part in this by choosing to buy items that are labelled organic or Fairtrade/Rainforest Alliance/EcoSocial, or that have an indication of sustainability, for

example "palm oil from sustainable sources or palm oil free and plastic free". These products don't always cost more than alternatives, but when they do you can be assured that somewhere a small-scale farmer and their community are benefitting environmentally as well as economically.

A chance to be themselves

The YMCA's family intervention work is one of the programmes funded by Christian Aid. Weekend camps are organised at their centre in Beit Sahour, near Bethlehem in the West Bank, bringing together counsellors, trainers, young boys who have faced imprisonment and their families for team building. They take part in

fun games designed to create team spirit and confidence as well as developing leadership skills. Tree stumps, set in the grounds of the buildings in Beit Sahour, are used for balancing and team spirit building while the swimming pool and adjoining hard area amenities encourage sporting activity. Many of these young boys, especially those from the refugee camps, have not had the luxury of being able to play sports because open spaces and facilities are non-existent in the camps and limited or of poor quality in the West Bank.

Twice yearly away days are also arranged for the wives, mothers and sisters involved with those needing counselling.

These days away are vital to the women as they provide them with a safe and secure environment with the chance to meet others in the same situation. Swimming in the onsite pool is always the highlight, with laughter filling the air as stress is released and problems shared. Many of the women struggle to understand the changes in their children after time in jail and want to keep them safe. However the young men want to be out with friends and this causes friction. The women know this may lead to more trouble and arrests and so continually worry. It is often the women who will keep a family going when husbands or sons are in jail.

So for the young men and their families these away days are a chance to recoup, refresh and revitalise as they continue to live with the difficulties experienced as a result of the Israeli occupation.


Update from Beyond Ourselves

It's hard to believe it's already been **seven years** since we first started training teachers in our contextualised literacy programme. Over those years, we've trained more than **8,500** teachers, equipping them to help over **one million children** build strong foundations in reading and writing.

National Rollout Progress

So far, we've rolled Jolly Phonics out to **3 of Zambia's 10 provinces**, and the new **National Curriculum** is closely aligned to our resource and training. The future of literacy in Zambia is looking very Jolly indeed - and we're thrilled to be part of the story!

What's even more exciting is that we are now reaching beyond Zambia. Right now, we're partnering with incredible teams in



Kenya and **Ethiopia** to create versions of our resource tailored to their contexts. Both countries are hoping to roll it out with the hope of transforming literacy levels for thousands of children.

And in June, Dan and I had the privilege of travelling to **Thailand**, where we explored how a new adaptation of our resource could serve the **Burmese migrant community** living there. It's estimated that over **14,000 migrant children** are studying in more than **60 Migrant Learning Centres** (schools) in the region. We left hopeful and excited about what could be possible as we work alongside local leaders to help make this vision a reality.

Our team in Zambia continues to grow and flourish. Since March, we've welcomed **Jordan** (joining the Education team) and **Chibangu** (leading the Dignity Campaign, which helps teens explore identity, belonging, purpose, and the real-life challenges they face).

There have been some powerful testimonies from the Dignity Campaign's Dare and Dream Days in recent months. Stories we look forward to sharing with you during this year's Big **Give Christmas Challenge**, **2nd-9th December**.

And there's more to celebrate - both **Matthews** and **Shadrick** welcomed new babies into their families, and **Hannah** married the wonderful Stanley! I'll be sure to capture some updated team photos during my trip in October.

Thank you for taking the time to read this update and thank you for your ongoing support and for being part of this incredible journey with us.

Peter Robinson, MP: salesman, politician, bachelor, spy. It was easy to get into Britain





Being a pastor in the Ukraine

Pastors in the Ukraine are continuing to minister to their beleaguered congregations, bringing comfort and hope into the most frightening and desperate war-torn situations.

So says Transform Europe Network, a Christian ministry which serves alongside indigenous Christians in Eastern Europe and the Balkans. In a recent report, it gives an update from one of its partners on the ground:

"Pastor Evgeniy serves in the war-torn Kherson region of southeastern Ukraine. Since 2022, he and a small group of volunteers have brought food, comfort, and hope to people living amid the destruction.

"Evgeniy and his team recently came to a village that had been shelled. One family's home was reduced to rubble, and their vital documents were buried. The team arrived in bright, civilian clothing, deliberately chosen to identify them as volunteers, not military. As they began to pull back the rubble, they remained calm, focusing on their priority to help the family escape.

"40 minutes later, the volunteers heard and saw a reconnaissance drone circling above them. They couldn't tell who it belonged to, but its presence was ominous. Then came a different sound - sharper, lower, and closer. A small military drone was heading straight for them. In a moment that could only be described as divine intervention, the drone clipped a tree branch and crashed to the ground next to the team's car.

"The team cautiously approached the drone, still twitching and sparking. Minutes later, a second drone appeared. It aimed for the fallen drone, possibly to trigger an explosion by striking the first. But it too missed its target—crashing about six meters from the car, hitting a nearby concrete wall rather than the group. No one was injured.

"But the volunteers knew then that they were under attack. They gathered their tools, helped the family into the vehicle, and drove away. Just seconds after they left, a third drone struck — right where

their car had been parked moments before. The resulting explosion could have easily taken their lives. But once again, by what they all believe was God's hand, they were spared.

"Reflecting on the events, Pastor Evgeniy was asked if he ever felt hatred or the desire for revenge. His answer was quiet, but unshakable

'No. I just understand. I understand the pain. I understand the fear. But if we don't bring light into this darkness, who will?'

"For Evgeniy, war is not a reason to harden the heart - it's a call to deeper compassion. Even as drones fly overhead and homes crumble, he continues his ministry, bringing food, prayer, and humanity into places others flee from.

"This is what faith looks like in the ruins. It looks like a small group in bright vests, carrying hope into danger. It looks like a pastor who chooses grace over vengeance. And it looks like a God who protects, even when the bombs fall close."

Since the talks involving the US and a possible ceasefire, the local leaders testify that instead of de-escalation, they've experienced a significant rise in attacks and shelling.

Transform Europe Network (TEN) asks Christians in the UK:

Please pray for pastors and church teams, exhausted by serving many people on the frontline.

Pray for those who are confused, discouraged and angry, even with each other. Pray for healing and comfort from the Holy Spirit. Churches in Ukraine do all they can to reconcile local people, but it is getting harder and harder.

Mothers are afraid that their teenage sons will be taken away for conscription, which has become increasingly aggressive. This also causes men to run away from home and so many families are fractured and deeply stressed as the war grinds on.

Enfield recycling

Recycling is an important part in helping our environment, but only if you recycle in the right way.

I recently checked what Enfield will accept as recycling and was surprised at some of the items, particularly shredded paper, jar lids and toothpaste tubes! Here's the detail from their website so you too can know what to include or exclude.

Before you put something in the bin:

- check it make sure it is a recyclable item, see below
- flatten it squash cardboard boxes and take out any bubble wrap or polystyrene (these cannot be recycled)
- rinse it give bottles, pots and jars a quick rinse before recycling
- lid it put the lid back on bottles and jars after rinsing. This helps the lids get recycled too.

What can go in your blue-lidded bin Tins and cans:

- Aerosol cans that are empty (such as deodorant and furniture polish)
- Aluminium foil (scrunched up in a fist-sized ball if you're unsure, visit YouTube - Do the scrunch test)
- Drink cans
- Food tins (rinse first)

Glass:

- Glass bottles (all colours)
- Glass jars (rinse and replace lids)
- Non-food bottles and jars (such as perfume, aftershave and face creams)

Plastics:

Plastic bottles (all types, such as drinks, cleaning products)

- and shampoo)
- Plastic tubs, pots and trays (such as margarine tubs, yoghurt pots and fruit trays)
- Cartons (such as Tetra Paks for fruit juice, milk and soup)
- Toothpaste tubes
- Empty plastic carrier bags

Paper:

- Newspaper and magazines
- Catalogues and directories
- · Office paper, junk mail and flyers
- Envelopes (including window envelopes)
- Brown packaging paper
- Shredded paper (place in a paper bag first)
- Books (consider donating to a charity shop)

Card:

- Corrugated cardboard (remove all polystyrene and other packaging)
- Printed cardboard boxes
- Shoe boxes

Putting the wrong items in your bin can mean good recyclables become waste. **Key items to exclude** are:

- · Dirty plastic and metal containers
- Polystyrene and plastic wrapping
- Batteries of all types and sizes
- Hard plastics (such as plastic toys and garden furniture)
- Light bulbs or broken glass
- Wallpaper

Continuing the Celebration!

On 6th-13th October this year many people around the world will be celebrating the Jewish festival of Tabernacles, or Sukkot. They will celebrate the Harvest, and also remember God bringing the Israelites out of Egypt and through 40 years in the desert.

The biblical book of Deuteronomy contains a description of what Tabernacles should have been like back then. "Celebrate... for seven days. Be joyful... you, your sons and daughters, your male and female servants, and the Levites, the foreigners, the fatherless and the widows who live in your towns."

These festivals were not just a celebration, but also an expression of gratitude to God: "celebrate the festival to the Lord your God... For the Lord your God will bless you in all your harvest and in all the work of your hands, and your joy will be complete." Tabernacles was a proper holiday, with two whole days off normal work and seven days of feasting.

Farming looks very different today. Very few of us have had to sweat long hours over crops, so we're not as ready for (or deserving of) a rest and a party as our ancestors were at this time of year. That might be even more the case in future, as the agri-tech revolution unfolds. For example, small autonomous tractors are already becoming available that do less damage to the soil and make better use of steep or oddly shaped fields.

Many arable farms already hire contractors to do the routine work with large specialist GPS-equipped machinery. In future years those people might find themselves using very different kinds of high-tech kit, acting more as land-management advisors, helping farmers to gather data and to find ways of improving soil quality, biodiversity and the water cycle.

I'm very grateful for the food that arrives on my shelves. Instead of worrying about whether or not we earned it, our modern-day Tabernacles or Harvest celebration could include ways of encouraging those involved in agriculture and developing new agricultural technologies, as well as enjoying how we can learn about and benefit from God's creation through Science.

So, after you celebrate Harvest at church, why not follow it up with a trip to a local farm this month? Why not learn from the ancient Israelites, and follow it up with a meal together? It stands to reason that those of us who live in countries where food is plentiful and cheap could do with being proportionately more generous in our gratitude and giving. Should we throw better parties? Probably!

Time to make your Will?

Been putting off writing or updating your Will? Next month the charity Will Aid's 'Make a Will Month' will offer you the opportunity to put your affairs in order, secure your loved one's future and give to charities helping those in need.



Participating solicitors are inviting people to contact them to book appointments for November, when they will prepare basic Wills without charging their normal fee. All that they will ask in return is that clients consider making a voluntary donation to Will Aid. The suggested donation is just £120 for a single Will, or £200 for a pair of mirror Wills.

The money raised is shared by nine UK charities: namely ActionAid, Age UK, British Red Cross, Christian Aid, Crisis, NSPCC, SCIAF (Scotland) and Trocaire (N. Ireland).

As many as half of all UK adults in the UK don't have a Will. They have not made any legally valid provision for what they would like to happen after their death. This can lead to a great deal of stress and uncertainty, as well as financial hardship, for those left behind.

Even if you have a Will, it is important to keep it up to date. Experts recommend routinely reviewing a Will every three to five years, and making a new Will as soon as significant family changes occur.

Andrew was one of the first disciples of Jesus, and the very first to bring someone else to Christ - his own brother. Like many fervent Jews at the time, Andrew and an unnamed companion had been drawn to the prophet John the Baptist. When one day John pointed Jesus out to Andrew and his friend, and described Him as the 'Lamb of God', the two young men realised that the next stage of their spiritual search was about to unfold. So, as Jesus made off, they followed Him.

When Jesus turned and asked them what they were 'seeking', all they could come up with was a lame enquiry about His current place of residence: "where are you staying".

The reply of Jesus was the most straight-forward invitation anyone can receive: "Come and see". So they did, and the results of their response were life changing. Andrew brought his brother, Peter, to Jesus, and soon the little apostolic band who would carry the message of Jesus to the whole world was formed.
